How FISP Evolved

2001 Invasive Species Working Group

- Federal & state agencies one strategic plan for prevention and management of all biological invasions in Florida
- Primarily *public* lands
- 2006 Private Land Incentive Group
 - Invasive species management on *private* lands
 - **Promoted partnerships** between public land managers, resource managers and private land managers
- 2008 The Florida Invasive Species Partnership
 - Public *and* private lands
 - Maintains same partnership focus



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FISP Mission

Improve the efficiency and effectiveness of preventing and controlling invasive nonnative species through partnering to increase communication, coordination and use of shared resources in order to protect wildlife habitat, working agricultural and forest lands, natural communities and biodiversity in Florida.



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FISP Goals

Encourage <u>voluntary partnerships</u> to increase effectiveness and decrease costs of comprehensive invasive species management;

Provide tools and resources that enable the development of unified approaches, <u>bridging the gap</u> <u>between private landowners' and land management</u> <u>agency invasive species efforts</u>; and,

Encourage the development, implementation and sharing of new and/or <u>innovative approaches</u> to address the threat of invasive species.

FISP Goal 1

Encourage voluntary partnerships to increase effectiveness and decrease costs of comprehensive invasive species management: **Cooperative Invasive Species Management Areas** a partnership of federal, state, and local government agencies, tribes, individuals and various interested groups that manage invasive species in a defined area.





- Diminishing agency support (staff time and money)

Recommendations Teach them how to fish Encourage ownership Don't forget the stick Change is good








