<u>NA-IPC Update (Don Hagan – VP)</u>

• Aaron Foster gave an overview of the North American Invasive Species Management Association's goals and mission. This group strives to promote and empower invasive species management (all taxa; not just plants). He envisions that this organization could become the collective voice for invasive species management in North America, and he would like to see more support and participation from EPPCs and IPCs. Currently some EPPCs and IPCs in the west are affiliated, but practically none in the SE are. Stephen Enloe (SE-EPPC) is going to research the organization and explore possible opportunities for cooperation

- Participants discussed how the NAIPC website needs to be kept up to date to show when/where upcoming invasive plant-related conferences and workshops will be held. The NAIPC website should also be used to promote National Invasive Species Awareness Week-related activities.
- Participants discussed how different EPPCs and IPCs could take turns developing webinars to be posted on the NAIPC website. Perhaps when an EPPC hosts a conference/meeting, they could convince 1-2 of their speakers to record a webinar while they are there. Chuck Bargeron has the capacity to post these webinars on the NAEPPC website. He has also developed and posted webinars before and is willing to provide helpful info to anyone who wishes to do one.

Plant list and EDRR Committee Update (Don Hagan - Chair)

1. Update EDRR factsheets and powerpoints: This will entail updating info, including maps (where necessary), and creating new materials for emerging species of concern*

*Minor edits to plant list may be necessary in order to clarify which species are EDRR priority.

2. **Improve coordination with education and outreach committee:** As we update and improve our materials, we need to make sure that they get in the hands of the folks who use them. The Education/Outreach committee may also have preferences regarding the format of the materials we produce. Let's get their input in our next meeting.

3. Review EDRR process: For example: How effective is our current EDRR system? Is the public aware of it? Can it be improved? Herrick: Sudie suggested that you may have some input here.

4. **Consider creating an EDRR Template for landowners/land managers:** Some people may be interested in an easy to use EDRR "template" that they could use for prioritization/planning on the lands they manage. Perhaps we could modify something that already exists?
